Why you should minor in English:

- You will be telling prospective employers and graduate schools that you are likely to read and write well.
- You can select your own plan of electives in literature, linguistics, or writing to complement your major, career goals, and personal interests.
- You will receive a formal designation of the minor on your transcript.

How to declare English minor:

You do not declare your minor until you apply for graduation. At that point, you will need to have your minor certified by the English Department. Please note, however, that you should seek advisement from the Department as soon as you decide to pursue the minor – the earlier, the better.

The Required Introductory Course (3 credits)

ENG 2000 – Writing about Literature 3

This course should be taken as soon as possible. In addition to counting toward the minor, it may be used to satisfy a General Education breadth requirement in the humanities (under the old General Education plan).

THE ELECTIVES (15 CREDITS)

Select with advisement five courses in or 15 credits worth of literature, linguistics, writing, or journalism. At least two courses must be on the 3000 or 4000 level and no more than two courses may be transferred from another institution.

ENG 1030: College Composition (or its equivalent) and ENG 2403: World Literature, which are General Education Foundations Requirements, **cannot** count toward the minor.

Note: ENG 1030 (Composition) or its equivalent, is a prerequisite for all ENG 2000, 3000, and 4000 level courses. ENG 2403 (World Literature) or its equivalent is a prerequisite for all 2000, 3000, and 4000 level Literature courses.
